FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

God willing, in few days, on Saturday, January 24 we will be able to participate as a parish in the 11th Walk-for- Life-West-Coast, protesting abortion, in San Francisco, CA. The first march for life of the West Coast took place January 22, 2005. Since then, the participation of those who believe in the sanctity of life has increased in numbers and in strength with the firm desire that life can be respected and loved in our country from its very beginning until its natural end.

It is important for all of us to acknowledge that the cause of life is in fact at the same time the cause of the Gospel and the cause of man, the cause entrusted to the Church. Let's recall the words of Saint John Paul II at the beginning of his Encyclical Letter *Evangelium Vitae*: "The Gospel of life is at the heart of Jesus' message. Lovingly received day after day by the Church, it is to be preached with dauntless fidelity as 'good news' to the people of every age and culture. At the dawn of salvation, it is the Birth of a Child which is proclaimed as joyful news: *I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord* (Lk 2:10-11). The source of this *great joy* is the Birth of the Savior; but Christmas also reveals the full meaning of every human birth, and the joy which accompanies the Birth of the Messiah is thus seen to be the foundation and fulfillment of joy at every child born into the world (cf. Jn 16:21). When He presents the heart of his redemptive mission, Jesus says: *I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly* (Jn 10:10). In truth, He is referring to that *new* and *eternal* life which consists in communion with the Father, to which every person is freely called in the Son by the power of the Sanctifying Spirit. It is precisely in this *life* that all the aspects and stages of human life achieve their full significance."

In 1998, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) published "Living the Gospel of Life: A Challenge to American Catholics" echoing the words of St. John Paul II during his visit *ad limina* to the Bishop of Rome. There they stated: "God is always ready to answer our prayers for help with the virtues we need to do His will. First and foremost we need the **courage** and the honesty to speak the truth about human life, no matter how high the cost to ourselves. The great lie of our age is that we are powerless in the face of the compromises, structures and temptations of mass culture. But we are not powerless. We can make a difference. We belong to the Lord, in Him is our strength, and through His grace, we can change the world. We also need the **humility** to listen well to both friend and opponent on the abortion issue, learning from each and forgetting ourselves. We need the **perseverance** to continue the struggle for the protection of human life, no matter what the setbacks, trusting in God and in the ultimate fruitfulness of the task He has called us to. We need the **prudence** to know when and how to act in the public arena –and also to recognize and dismiss that fear of acting which postures as prudence itself. And finally we need the great foundation of every apostolic life: **faith, hope and charity**. **Faith** not in moral or political abstractions, but in the personal presence of God; **hope** not in our own ingenuity, but in His goodness and mercy; and **love** for others, including those who oppose us, rooted in the love God showers down on us."

Let us not be heedless to their appeal: "We encourage all citizens, particularly Catholics, to embrace their citizenship not merely as a duty and privilege, but as an opportunity meaningfully to participate in building the culture of life. Every voice matters in the public forum. Every vote counts. Every act of responsible citizenship is an exercise of significant individual power. We must exercise that power in ways that defend human life, especially those of God's children who are unborn, disabled or otherwise vulnerable. We get the public officials we deserve. Their virtue –or lack thereof– is a judgment not only on them, but on us. Because of this, we urge our fellow citizens to see beyond party politics, to analyze campaign rhetoric critically, and to choose their political leaders according to principle, not party affiliation or mere self-interest."

A final request from the lips of Saint John Paul II: "a great prayer for life is urgently needed, a prayer which will rise up throughout the world." To all those who for various reasons are unable to take part in the Walk-for-Life, please accompany us with your prayers. Ask our Lady, patroness of America, to renew in us a love for the beauty and sanctity of the human person from conception to natural death. And may the Mother of our Savior, open our hearts to the Gospel-of-Life, protect our nation, and make us witnesses to the truth.

MEMORANDUM

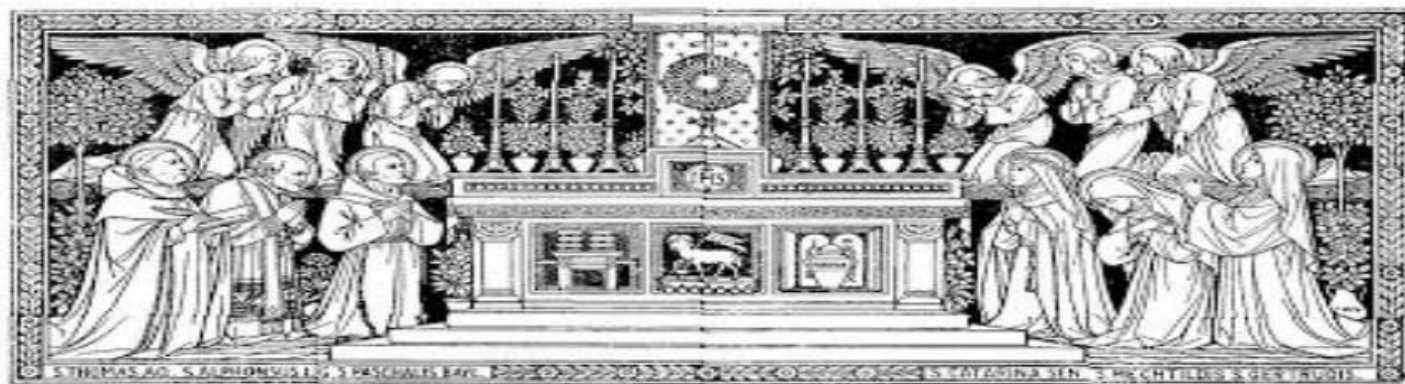
To: Priests, Deacons, Pastoral Ministers, Principals, Liturgists and Liturgical Ministers
From: Bishop Patrick J. McGrath
Re: Temporary Liturgical Adaptations during the 2015 Flu/Cold Season
Date: January 10, 2015

The Public Health Officer of Santa Clara County has again requested that we make a number of temporary adaptations to our celebrations of the Eucharist, so as to foster the health of our worshipping communities and also of the wider community. Given the anticipated increase of the flu throughout the Diocese in upcoming weeks, I ask that these adaptations be implemented by next weekend, January 17/18.

1. For the duration of the flu/cold/virus season, Holy Communion will not be shared under the form of Consecrated Wine. Concelebrating priests and assisting deacons are to receive the Precious Blood by means of intinction. Provision should be made for those parishioners who rely upon receiving Holy Communion under the Sacred Species of consecrated wine because of celiac disease or other conditions that do not tolerate the ingestion of a consecrated host.
2. For the duration of the flu/cold/virus season, Holy Communion will be distributed only into the hands of communicants; during this time, Holy Communion will not be distributed on the tongue.
3. For the duration of the flu/cold/virus season, people should not hold hands during the recitation or singing of the Lord's Prayer.
4. For the duration of the flu/cold/virus season, the Sign of Peace should be adapted so as to allow for a greeting that does not involve shaking hands or touching.
5. For the duration of the flu/cold/virus season, all who administer Holy Communion are to wash their hands with an alcohol-based anti-bacterial solution, such as Purell, before and after they administer the Sacrament. This precaution also extends to those who minister to the homebound.
6. These adaptations are to remain in effect throughout the Diocese until conditions allow me to rescind them.

When you explain these adapted procedures to your people, please remind them that the obligation to participate in Sunday Mass does not hold for those who are seriously ill, and that it would be a mark of Christian charity for anyone who has fever, cough or other such symptoms to remain at home. Please refer to the article, "*Liturgy, Cold, and the Flu: Common Sense Practices*," which Diana Macalintal has circulated throughout the Diocese.

Thank you for your immediate attention to these matters and for undertaking the catechesis that will be necessary to introduce these adaptations to your parishes and other communities by the weekend of January 17/18.

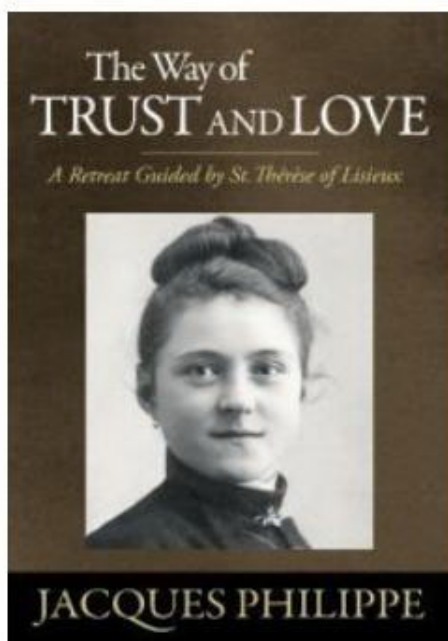
The Benedict XVI Institute was launched in part 'to recover a sense of our sacred music,' Archbishop Salvatore Cordileone said. by CARL BUNDERSON/CNA/EWTN NEWS 02/10/2014 Comments

The institute had been launched at a Jan. 5 vespers service for the Epiphany, at which both the archbishop and the foundation's director, Fr. Samuel Weber, spoke.

The Benedictine priest taught the more than 200 attendants how to chant, and in his interview with CNA the archbishop affirmed that such a recovery of sacred music "really is just trying to do what the Church has asked us to do, at Vatican II and ever since, in all the documents on music and the liturgy, that the people also be well formed in singing the sacred repertoire."

He alluded to the Vatican II document on the liturgy, "Sacrosanctum Concilium," which acknowledged Gregorian chant as "especially suited to the Roman liturgy," thus forming the core of the "sacred repertoire." We are already at a more mature level and, as far as the development of virtues is concerned, we are trying to achieve a certain balance between solid grounding on something permanent, a realistic assessment of one's potentialities as a person, and bold action to achieve a genuine good." 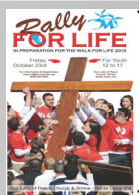

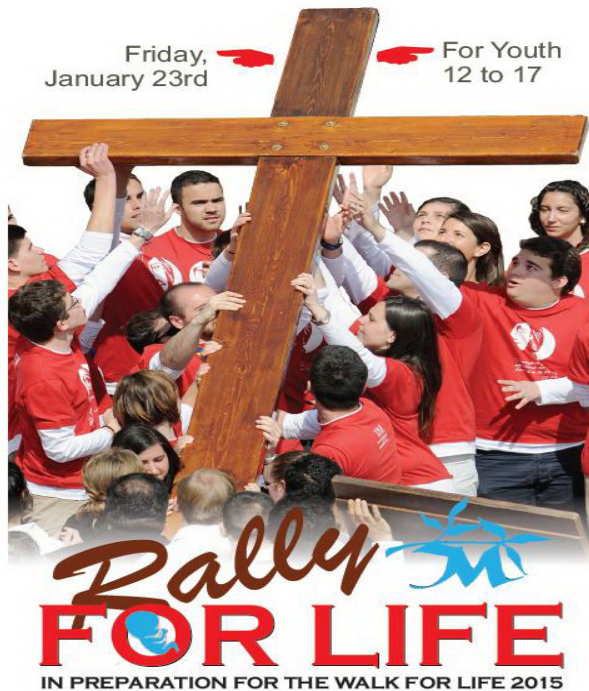

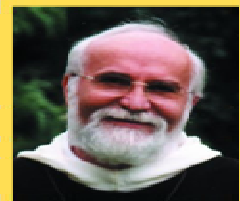
