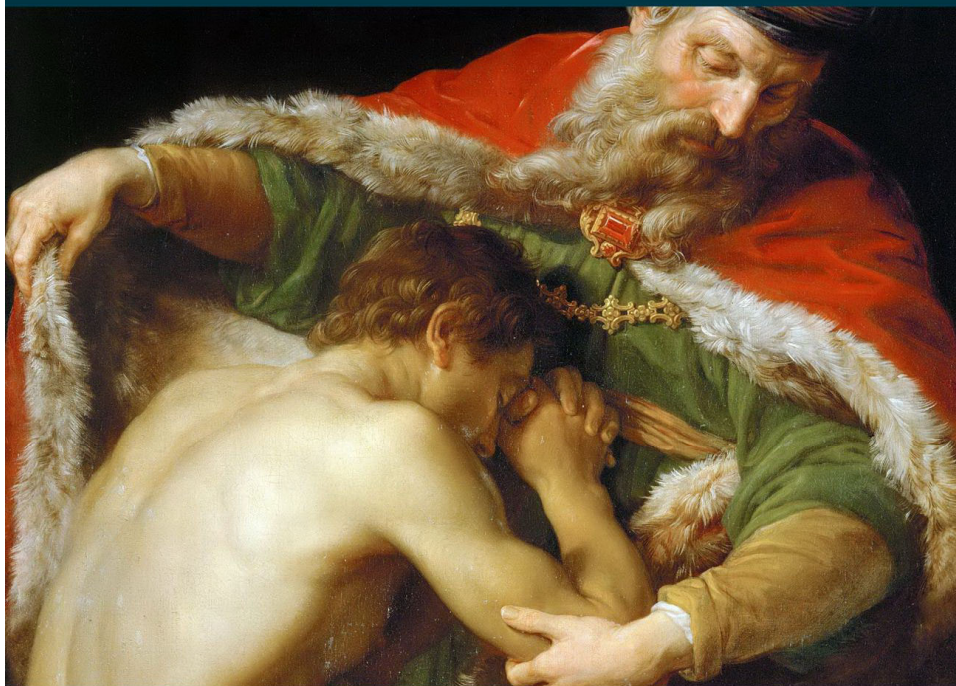

Our Lady of Peace is a church and shrine dedicated to the greater glory of God and the salvation of souls.

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Parishioners,

This coming March 19, we will celebrate the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On that day we will pray most especially for our IVE Sisters who will celebrate the 28th Anniversary of their Institute's foundation.

The feast of St. Joseph on March 19, which appears around the year 800 in a French Calendar, did not become widespread until the fourteenth or fifteenth century. There was a feast in honor of St. Joseph in the Roman Breviary published in 1482, but the first Mass celebrated in his honor at Rome was in 1505. In the East, however, the feast was celebrated as early as the fifth century according to the Coptic Calendar, but on a different date. In 1621 Pope Gregory XV made the feast of St. Joseph a holy day of obligation, but that is no longer universally observed. (Lodi, Enzo, Saints of the Roman Calendar)

Pious and liturgical devotion to St. Joseph is first recorded with certainty in the seventh century, though reference to him is made in Sacred Scripture and multiple patristic texts earlier than that. On December 8, 1870, by virtue of the decision of Blessed Pope Pius IX, the Sacred Congregation of Rites promulgated the decree *Quemadmodum Deus*, declaring St. Joseph the Patron of the Universal Church. In the following year, the Holy Father expanded on the meaning of this proclamation in his document *Inclitum Patriarcham* (1871). His successor, Pope Leo XIII, further developed the Church's understanding of the protection that St. Joseph could afford to the Church during times of great attack in *Quamquam Pluries* (1889). *Redemptoris Custos* was written by Saint John Paul II on the occasion of the centenary of Pope Leo XIII's document.

On May 1, 2013, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments promulgated the decree *Paternas vices* by the authority of the Supreme Pontiff, Pope Francis. The decree instructs that the name of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, should be inserted into Eucharistic Prayers II, III, and IV. Already on November 13, 1962, Pope John XXIII had inserted the name of St. Joseph into the first Eucharistic Prayer (the Roman Canon), and now that work has been carried forward to the other three Eucharistic Prayers, initially by Pope Benedict XVI and now confirmed by Pope Francis.

The decree *Paternas vices* draws some of its language from this exhortation, expressing in concise words the role of St. Joseph in the economy of salvation, stating, for example, that St. Joseph, "stands as an exemplary model of the kindness and humility that the Christian faith raises to a great destiny, and demonstrates the ordinary and simple virtues necessary for men to be good and genuine followers of Christ. Through these virtues, this Just man, caring most lovingly for the Mother of God and happily dedicating himself to the upbringing of Jesus Christ, was placed as guardian over God the Father's most precious treasures."

Many saints and spiritual writers have been especially devoted to St. Joseph, those who first promoted the devotion include: St. Margaret of Cortona (1247-1297), St. Bridget of Sweden (1303-1373), St. Vincent Ferrer (1350-1419), and St. Bernardine of Siena (1380-1444)—whose sermon is used for the Office of Readings for March 19. Finally, the Carmelite friars recognized his feast and included it in the calendar of their Order in 1498. (Lodi, p.75) One of the greatest Carmelite saints, St. Teresa of Avila had great influence in further promoting the devotion to St. Joseph.

"I wish I could persuade everyone to be devoted to this glorious saint [St. Joseph], for I have great experience of the blessings which he can obtain from God," wrote St. Teresa of Avila. (Autobiography, Chapter 6) Also, during a period of great illness in her young adult life, she turned her focus to the "heavenly doctors." Through the intercession of St. Joseph, she was "delivered...both from this trouble and also from other and greater troubles concerning my honor and the loss of my soul, and that he gave me greater blessings than I could ask of him." Her devotion to glorious St. Joseph was promulgated throughout the many Carmels she established as part of the reform.

I commend all of you to the protection and intercession of this good father and patron of those in need.

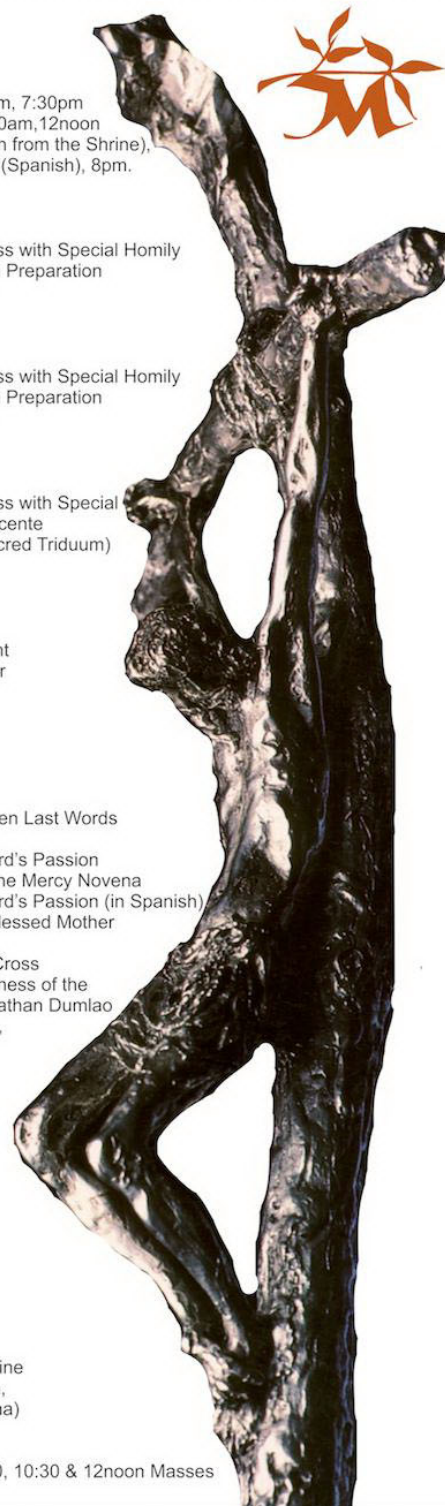

LENTEN SEASON

Week 5 of Lent

Then a voice came from the sky: "I have glorified it, and will glorify it again." (John 12:28)

Reflection: Prayer to be Freed of the Seven Deadly Sins

O meek Savior and Prince of Peace, implant in me the virtues of gentleness and patience. Let me curb the fury of anger and restrain all resentment and impatience so as to overcome evil with good, attain your peace, and rejoice in your love.

O Model of humility, divest me of all pride and arrogance. Let me acknowledge my weakness and sinfulness, so that I may bear mockery and contempt for your sake and esteem myself as lowly in your sight.

O Teacher of abstinence, help me to serve you rather than our appetites. Keep me from gluttony - the inordinate love of food and drink and let me hunger and thirst for your justice.

O Lover of purity, remove all lust from my heart, so that I may serve you with a pure mind and a chaste body.

O Father of the poor, help me to avoid all covetousness for earthly goods and give me a love for heavenly things. Inspire me to give to the needy, just as you gave your life that I might inherit eternal treasures.

O Exemplar of love, keep me from all envy and ill-will. Let the grace of your love dwell in me that I may rejoice in the happiness of others and bewail their adversities.

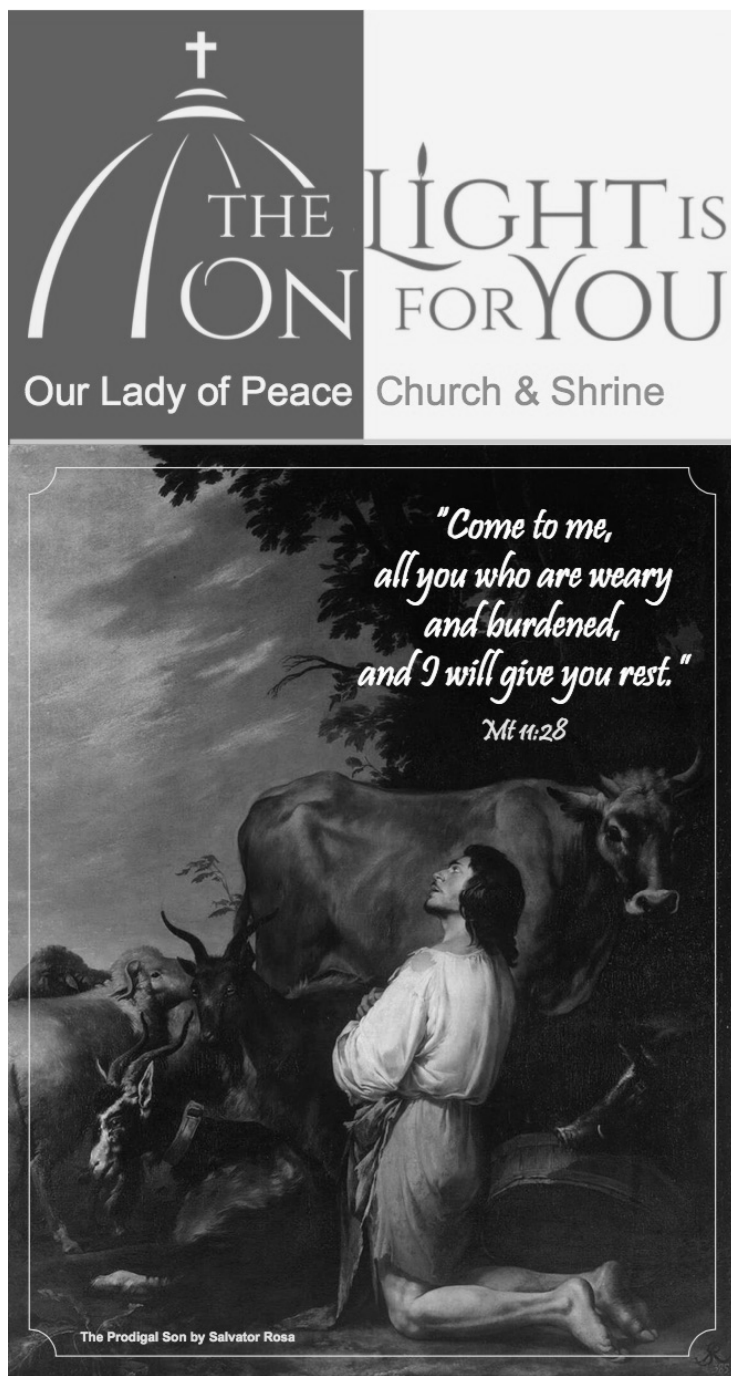
O zealous Lover of souls, keep me from all sloth of mind or body. Inspire me with zeal for your glory, so that I may do all things for you and in you.

Lenten Action: Passiontide is the last two weeks of Lent, when the readings and prayers of the liturgy focus on the Passion of Our Lord. The word 'passion', in the Christian sense, does not mean an intense emotion; it refers to the historical events of Jesus' suffering and death. Although for several centuries the Fifth Sunday of Lent was known as Passion Sunday, after the Second Vatican Council this name was restored to the Sunday at beginning of Holy Week, formerly called Palm Sunday. As a penitential season of the Church, Passiontide is evidently even more ancient than Lent.

Lenten Action: Reach out to someone who is alienated from your group.

Prayer: Father, help us keep in mind that Christ our Savior lives with you in glory and promised to remain with us until the end of time. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

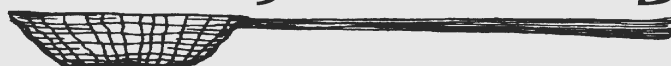

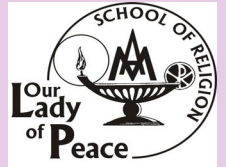

Why Teenagers Rebel



"THE MOOD TODAY IS TO GIVE UP on teenagers.

Youth has **higher aspirations** than adults generally suspect, but **adults do not challenge these aspirations, nor lead them to the heights.** The young people today have a **spirit of sacrifice and a readiness for surrender which has been untapped.** The Communists, the Nazis and the Fascists in the last generation knew how to appeal to the **sacrificial spirit in youth.** Youth is sick and tired of a **milk and water**

liberalism which calls for no self-denial. But the elders fail to awaken that latent spirit.

Can an alcoholic father ever convince his teenage son to be temperate? Can a mother who has been divorced three times ever tell her teenage daughter that she must always be true to her word? Why not? Because **reverence for a precept depends on reverence for the one who gives the precept.** A teenager instinctively knows that if parents do not recognize any authority over him, then by what right do the parents command?

Teenagers do not ever state this clearly; they do not even know the instinctive reasons why they rebel against their parents; but like little cogs, **they rebel against the big cogs who refuse to do as they should.**

The fourth commandment of God which is **"Honor thy father and thy mother"** is the link between **the first three which relate to our duties to God, and the last six which relate to our duties as neighbors.** From this commandment follows this truth: **Parents who honor God always find it easy to train their children to honor them, the parents; children who honor their parents always find it easy to honor their Heavenly Father.** Juvenile delinquency will diminish when parents learn that God is not a swear word."

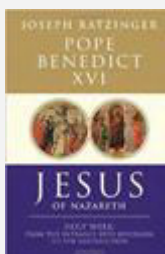

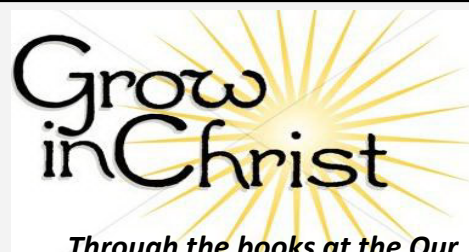

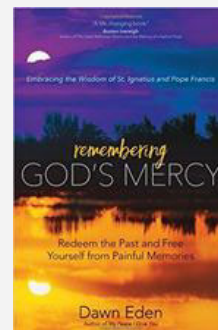
