

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Conversations On Culture: What's Poetry Good For?

Dear Friends,

Initially I had planned to interrupt our conversation on culture in order to introduce the season of Lent. I do not plan to do that; I would like to keep our conversation going. I would like to, however, introduce Lent into this point of the conversation. I think that there is something very poetic about Lent.

Today we are going to talk about poetry. Poetry helps us to capture a sense of the present. Our culture has suffered the loss of poetry. We have lost poetry, but you cannot live without it. The loss of poetry is a loss in the imaginative life. Joseph Pearce goes so far as to say, “We live in an unpoetic age. No. Worse. We live in an anti-poetic age.”

Given the fact that we do not read or write poetry, I realize that to many of you, this may seem like a total waste of space. You may be saying to yourself, “let’s make better use of our time, it is the First Sunday of Lent after all! Why talk about poetry?!” Because we must.

What we are speaking about here is discovering the ordinary way of knowing, one that is cultivated by poetry. When this is lacking we become dull, illiterate, and unable to perceive the moment well. Poetry helps us to ponder the deeper meaning of things. In a poem, for example, every single syllable has significance. Spending endless hours in distraction through technology will most definitely compromise our senses – especially our imagination, which may be called the seat of amazement and wonder. Poetry is more than sentimental silly stuff that serves as a pacifier for those who do not know how to take life seriously. On the contrary, the poet might be seen as one who takes life most seriously, that is to say, the one who “knows how to live in the world and how not to live in it.” (Mark van Doren, *The Possible Importance of Poetry*) In this way, poetry helps to cultivate within us a poetic view on life—one that seeks to listen and ponder first rather than speak and do. I think that we could definitely use much cultivation in this regard; especially in our current climate that is highly utilitarian. And sometimes, it is only through the lens of poetry that we can perceive the usefulness of something, for example, a relationship. Take this poem on one’s relationship with Christ, composed by the English Martyr, St. Robert Southwell:

Let folly praise that fancy loves, I praise and love that Child
 Whose heart no thought, whose tongue no word,
 whose hand no deed defiled.
 I praise him most, I love him best, all praise and love is his,
 While him I love, in him I live, and cannot live amiss.
 Love’s sweetest mark, laud’s highest theme,
 man’s most desired light,
 To love him life, to leave him death, to live in him delight.
 He mine by gift, I his by debt, thus each to other due,
 First friend he was, best friend he is, all times will try him true.

Another example we could appeal to is Sacred Scripture, every single word has meaning. It is seething with significance. Therefore, we would do well to adopt a posture of listening as opposed to analyzing, allowing the text to speak to us and saturate our lives to such a degree that we understand that we are involved in it. Listen to the way in which St. Gregory the Great puts it: “Sacred Scripture is offered like a kind of mirror to the eyes of our mind, that we may see our interior face in it. For there we recognize our ugliness and our beauty. There we measure our progress; there we see how far we are from our goal. For the Bible tells stories of power, and it incites our weak hearts to imitate them. While proclaiming their victorious deeds in the battle against the vices, it strengthens our feebleness. The words of the Bible cause our minds to tremble less at the thought of battle when placed before the many brave soldiers’ trophies

30 DAYS OF PRAYER TO ST. JOSEPH

Ever blessed and glorious Joseph, kind and loving father, and helpful friend of all in sorrow! You are the good father and protector of orphans, the defender of the defenseless, the patron of those in need and sorrow. Look kindly on my request. My sins have drawn down on me the just displeasure of my God, and so I am surrounded with unhappiness. To you, loving guardian of the Family of Nazareth, do I go for help and protection.

Listen, then, I beg you, with fatherly concern, to my earnest prayers, and obtain for me the favors I ask.

I ask it by the infinite mercy of the eternal Son of God, which moved Him to take our nature and to be born into this world of sorrow.

I ask it by the weariness and suffering you endured when you found no shelter at the inn of Bethlehem for the holy Virgin, nor a house where the Son of God could be born. Then, being everywhere refused, you had to allow the Queen of Heaven to give birth to the world's Redeemer in a cave.

I ask it by the loveliness and power of that sacred Name, Jesus, which you conferred on the adorable infant.

I ask it by that painful torture you felt at the prophecy of holy Simeon, which declared the Child Jesus and His holy Mother future victims of our sins and of their great love for us.

I ask it through your sorrow and pain of soul when the angel declared to you that the life of the Child Jesus was sought by His enemies. From their evil plan you had to flee with Him and His Blessed Mother to Egypt. I ask it by all the suffering, weariness, and labors of that long and dangerous journey.

I ask it by all your care to protect the Sacred Child and His Immaculate Mother during your second journey, when you were ordered to return to your own country. I

ask it by your peaceful life in Nazareth where you met with so many joys and sorrows.

I ask it by your great distress when the adorable Child was lost to you and His Mother for three days. I ask it by your joy at finding Him in the Temple, and by the comfort you found at Nazareth, while living in the company of the Child Jesus. I ask it by the wonderful submission He showed in His obedience to you.

I ask it by the perfect love and conformity you showed in accepting the Divine order to depart from this life, and from the company of Jesus and Mary. I ask it by the joy which filled your soul, when the Redeemer of the world, triumphant over death and hell, entered into the possession of His kingdom and led you into it with special honors.

I ask it through Mary's glorious Assumption, and through that endless happiness you have with her in the presence of God.

O good father! I beg you, by all your sufferings, sorrows, and joys, to hear me and obtain for me what I ask.

Obtain for all those who have asked my prayers everything that is useful to them in the plan of God. Finally, my dear patron and father, be with me and all who are dear to me in our last moments, that we may eternally sing the praises of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Amen.

that we see hanging. Sometimes the Bible not only boasts to us of their virtues but even admits their failures, so that we may learn by imitation what to appropriate from the battles won by the valiant but also what to avoid from the battles lost. . . . To the extent that their triumphs encourage them to rejoice, their failures depress them and worry them, so that the listener learns hope and confidence from the former and fear and humility from the latter.” (*Commentary on the Book of Job*, bk. 2, n. 1)

To conclude, let us return to the liturgical season of Lent that we began this past Wednesday. There is a mystery about it. “We may be sure, that a season, so sacred as this of Lent, is rich in mysteries.” (Abbot Gueranger, *The Liturgical Year*) We are reminded of so many things during this time, the colors, the number forty, the ashes, the fasting, the music; all of this takes us back to the past, the fall and the plan of redemption; the present, our sinfulness and God’s help; and the future, eternity.

May this be a time that we listen well and allow the call to conversion speak to our hearts. Listen, understand, and take action.

FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Lenten Regulations on Fast and Abstinence

Abstinence from meat is observed on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent by all Catholics 14 years and older.

Fasting is observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those bound by this rule may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted as necessary to maintain strength according to one’s needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The special Pascal fast and abstinence are observed on Good Friday, and where possible, Holy Saturday. On these days, Christians prepare themselves by these disciplines in anticipation of the renewal of their baptismal commitment on Easter.

From its earliest days, the Church has urged the baptized and the catechumens to observe the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer as a preparation for the celebration of Easter. Failure to observe individual days of penance is not considered serious, but failure to observe any penitential days at all or a substantial number of such days must be considered serious.

During Lent, the Church encourages attendance at daily Mass, self-imposed times of fasting, and generosity to local, national, and worldwide programs of sharing.

ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

My Jesus,
I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

What is a Spiritual Communion?

St. Thomas Aquinas once defined Spiritual Communion as “an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament and in lovingly embracing Him as if we had actually received Him.” You just need to approach Him with sincerity, humility and a desire to follow in His footsteps in acts of faith and charity.

St. Jean-Marie Vianney, a French priest famous for converting countless souls to Christ in his parish of Ars in the 19th century, once said “when we feel the love of God growing cold, let us instantly make a Spiritual Communion. When we cannot go to the church, let us turn towards the tabernacle; no wall can shut us out from the good God.”

MASS INTENTION REQUESTS

The calendar is currently open for Mass intention requests for the months of February & March 2021! (Please continue to check for updates as we adapt to new changes). **Please follow the temporary process listed below.**

Although the parish office is closed to drop-in visitors, we have instituted a temporary process to accept and process Mass Intention requests via email. The normal Mass Intention guidelines listed below apply, including the 25 character limit.

Mass Intention request requirements:

- Donation of \$10 per Mass
- Up to two (2) separate Masses that do not occur in the same week may be requested
- Each Mass may only have 2 names with a limit of 25 characters (including spaces) per Mass request, and only one intention option chosen (Birthday, Death Anniversary, Health, Special Intentions, Thanksgiving, or Wedding Anniversary). Please remember to note if the request is for someone living or deceased.
- No changes can be made once the requests have been placed into the calendar.
- No holds or reservations will be accepted. No exceptions can be made.

In order to request a Mass Intention during this shelter-in time, please carefully follow the steps below:

1. First, please send an email with your full name, phone number, Mass Intention request text (limit 25 characters), and preferred date/time to mass@olop-shrine.org. Please refer to the Mass Intention Requests form above to see what details you will need to provide.
2. Once the email is received, our staff will look through the calendar for availability. Until the intention request is finalized by a confirmation reply email from our staff, the intention is not considered entered in the calendar. **Due to the volume of requests, it is best to request a Mass intention at least one week prior to the desired date.**
3. If there is a time conflict with the requested date/time, our staff member will call you to arrange an alternative date and time. You will also receive a call if there are any changes needed to the request.
4. The confirmation email will give a link indicating how to submit your Mass Intention request donation online.
